After his stunning debut in the anthology *The Age of Fever*, the debut novel of a new voice of contemporary Italian narrative has finally arrived.

A man is left by the woman he loves. At the beginning he tries to take it well. He goes to work, goes out with his friends, gets on with his life as if nothing has happened. Then one day he turns out to yelp. An uncontrollable yelp escapes from his lips and begins to follow him everywhere, every time he remembers her.

Heartbroken for her leaving and afraid to publicly show that weakness, the man isolates himself more and more, but even doing so he doesn't run away from his destiny. One night, exhausted and to the utmost of his desperation, he turns out in a dog. With his new body he leaves his house and begins an adventure through uncharted territories.

The men who yelps, the dog without a name, begins a dizzying and struggling journey searching the woman. He will find out that love is not just a feeling, a dark force, a magnetic field in which the most surprising things happen, but it's an entire world, tender and irresistible at the same time. The Heart is a Dog Without a Name narrates the unforgattable story with a warm, bright and delicate writing. In his debut novel Giuseppe Zucco confirms and reinvents a verse by Emily Dickinson, "That love is all there is".



We are in 2015 and, except working, days are scored by rock music, going out all nigh long in local clubs and tragicomic amateur football competitions on the peripheral frozen grounds. The fact is that Umberto has also a family (Lisa, his wife; Sebastiano, a child who grows quickly; and Fulvia, a cat capable of long telepathic conversations), and he is afraid he no longer belongs to his household. Even his birth family is not a solid support. Maybe it's time to cross the long shadow line we call youth.

With *The Flood*, Andrea Cisi tells us a story in which people both laugh and cry, looking for a meaning and an identity in a period of time that seem to be denied at every step, vividly representing the beautiful Italian province of 2000's: a heart that never stops beating, a place of the soul much richer, more confusing and unpredictable than you might think.

In the summer of 2004, Caterina goes to see her boyfriend at Rebibbia Prison. They are both wild flowers of the extreme outskirts of Rome, and, in the past, they tried to build a dream together: to run a strip-tease club. Caterina, as a teenager, had also been a dancer, but after an injury she had to quit; in the last few years she had been performing as a stripper in her and Aurelio's strip club. He has been in prison for some months. He is convinced that somebody set him up. During the prison talk Aurelio asked Caterina if she knew something. She says no. How would Aurelio react if he knew that, as soon as she had left the prison, Caterina gets in bed with the policeman who arrested him?

An unusual, feverish and tropical Rome, and a protagonist equally changeable and dark: a novel, and a writer, that you will carry in your heart for a long time.

Cleopatra Goes to Prison is a breathtaking, hard and twisty novel. It tells about Rome, wider and more unknown than what we could think reading the newspapers, and above all about its outskirts, the real place where stories are born during these years. And it tells about who, despite of delusions and broken dreams, keeps living and loving.

Tina, a preadolescent girl that everyone mistakes for a boy, gets to Pantelleria with her mother and her sister Bea. It seems to be a normal summer holyday, but this is not the case. Some months before, Tina's father left his wife to chase a lover much younger then him. Tina and Bea see changing moods on their mother face: sadness, optimism, desperation.

But at their age even the tragedy of the end of familiar unity can take the shape of an adventure. A further difficulty is the presence of strange figures on the island: a French world-class swimmer by whom Tina is fascinated, her boyfriend who strikes at Bea's heart, a desperate man who attracts her mother more than he should.

Summer goes on but before it ends the impact with sufferance given by the change, even though put off, will be felt.

Torino creates a perfect narrative frame for one of the most classical passages: the excruciating moment in which we grow to adulthood and we realize that we irreparably lost something.

In the imaginary little town of Corsignano – located between Toscana and Umbria – life goes on as usual. There are people who work, women who betray their men and men that, after having lost their fortunes by playing cards, get into troubles.

There is an old woman who remembers the day when she was abandoned at the altar, a crooked lawyer, two beautiful sisters who stand out for prostitution and a little girl who risks to die. There is also a little community of boars that scampers through the nearby woods, as it usually happens in the provinces of central Italy.

It happens that one day one of these boars, hit by a ray of light just in the middle of his forehead, acquires in a mysterious way capacities that go beyond his own nature.

Not only he is able to elaborate thoughts just like a human being does but, just like we do, he also becomes aware of death. He is too human to be accepted by his counterparts, and too much beast notto be frightened by human beings: "the boar who shot Liberty Valance" suddenly finds himself in a no man's land that on one hand throws him in solitude and on the other hand gives him the capacity/faculty of entering in the secrets of Corsignano, by reading in the hearts of its inhabitants more than how they are able to do (because of their cynism or fear).

Giordano Meacci is one of the screenwriters of Non essere cattivo, Claudio Caligari's last movie, presented at 2015 Venice Film Festival, nominated for Oscars 2016 Foreign Language Film and selected for 2016 David di Donatello Award.

There is one test in life that everyone has to face: saying goodbye to the persons we love. Mattia is an everyday man. He lives in a small town, he works in a video store, he's got a girlfriend, and he will maybe find one day the necessary power to realize his projects, those projects that he carries on without a firm belief. His existence seems to be normal, until his mother gets a cancer. From that moment his life overturns like in a daily horror movie where even the most apparently common events become obstacles that have to be heroically overcome. Doctors do their job with a cold competence, and it's not easy to understand how to behave in front of them. The relationship with his relatives reveals its true nature as his mother's illness advances, the compassion of his friends makes him engage a cruel and exhausting fight. Furthermore, strange anonymous letters about his father begin to arrive. Even his girlfriend seems different under the fire of a sufferance that burns without pause. But in this journey, in which everything seems to be scandalously out of place (and revelatory at the same time), the relationship between Mattia and his mother is the deepest emotional dimension, a place of the soul where things, in the very same moment in which abandon us, finally reveal their true meaning.

Summer 1975. In a village on the eastern coast of Puglia, a war is rekindled between the sons of the well-to-do familes and the children of the local fishermen, shepherds, and farmers: the so-called cafoni or bumpkins. Hostilities are declared by the leader of the well-to-do families, whose real first name is Angelo, but whose nickname bears the mark of a champion and of the perfidious: Francisco Marinho (a buccaneering Brazilian soccer star of the period), also known as the Evil One. Obsessed with his hatred for the cafoni - part buffoon, part local soccer-league George Bush - Francisco Marino fights in the name of the class division and historic continuity. Faith versus doubt. Answers versus questions. Dogma versus relativism. What happens when these counterpoints, so typical of our time, become a novel? What happens is that we have *Except for the Dog*, the amusing, and at the same time, highly serious novel from Carlo D'Amicis. A young Roman lawyer, tormented by psychosomatic problems of bladder control, struggles with his homosexuality, a tyrannical mother and an equally tyrannical boyfriend, and a financial situation bordering on poverty. When

he finds himself defending his own physician against charges of double homicide (charges that appear quite plausible), his torment encounters (or clashes with) the absolutism of science and especially with the absolutism of religious faith. Because, in the background, there hovers the Vatican and the death throes of a Pope who cannot seem to die. A great novel, in which a winning plot, a powerfully comical style, and an ability to portray the monstrosities of our time (from the new fundamentalisms to the old evils of the Ita-

«When I was six, making people laugh was my favourite game. When I was eight, it was an obsession. When I was ten, my drug». An ugly-looking only child growing up in rural Southern Italy in the '60s, Canio Spinato realizes very early that being funny is key to being liked, and being liked is the only pleasure that makes life worthwhile. His father Filippo, on the contrary, seems not to know what pleasure is: a serious, stern man, in 1965 he moves to Rome to join RAI (the newlyborn public broadcasting company), his mind set on making TV an instrument of education and moral enlightenment. While Filippo withers for decades in the lowest rungs of the company, fighting his losing battle, Canio pursues his dream

to become a successful, amusing, crowd-pleasing entertainer: he moves to Milan and crosses paths with an up-and-coming businessman called Silvio Berlusconi, on the verge of creating his finance-and-media empire. Canio becomes his most precious aide, but will it be his chance of a lifetime, or the beginning of his end?

Laugh-out funny and deeply compassionate, brimming with historical details and provocatively contemporary, D'Amicis's seventh novel, and his most accomplished to date, is a finely-wrought psychological portrait of a man and a whole country losing their innocence to that most human and corrupting of instincts: the love of being loved.

Costanza Jesurum crushes for us the giant of the Jungian studies and makes it useful for our everyday life.

In the last thirty years psychology and psychotherapy have become constant presences in our lives. Psychologists are often protagonists of public debates, they intervene on newspapers and TV, they have their say in the legal cases, they are consulted by those who decide social policies...Psychology is influential, it has been legitimated, and for those who are in therapy it's easier to understand the necessity of therapy and ask for its support. Despite this, psychotherapy appears to be like a hazy combination of issues: its efficacy begins to be as a given, but there is still a great confusion in its essence. What is it, compared to medicine? Why do so many schools exist? Which is the right cost for it? Why do we have to pay also cancelled sessions? Why parents who send their sons to therapy can't have information from the therapist every time they want it? Why so many therapists don't accept to treat relatives of their patients? Which are the risks in relying on who promises to cure our psyche?

In and out the room is a book that tries to articulate some clear answers addressed to those who go to therapy and, at the same time, to reconstruct the contemporary debate and the history of recent psychology. A jargon-free text about a world that we presume to know but it's less transparent then it seems to be, useful to do the most difficult and easiest thing ever: to become yourself.

Raffaele Alberto Ventura studied philosophy and cultural economy. He now works in Paris for a big publisher, in the marketing department. What's the lower social class? It's all of us, the impoverished middle class that has believed we could invent a future equal to our inclinations. At the dawn of an adult age that seems never to come, artificially kept alive by our family properties, by speculative bubbles or public welfare, we continue wasting huge quantity of resources in order to participate to a competition without winners, hoping in a prize that doesn't exist. But we have to broaden our view: isn't our entire society - mainly the Italian one but generally the western one - that founded itself on waste as the one and only driving force of the economy? The so-called lower class is the forefront of a capitalism in permanent crisis that talks to us with the rhethoric of the sixties to sell us life styles that we cannot afford. The debt that crashes us down is nothing but the overthrown image of our disappointed hopes.



Fitzgerald was not yet 22 when he gave himself three objectives: to marry Zelda Sayre, to write books "of perennial value" and to gain a lot of money in order to live "over the top". During all his career he gained an astronomical sum of money that he pulverized without knowing how, living like a man who is always in need of money, writing short stories one after the other and begging advances on future incomes.

But how was really his life like? Full of parties, villas and dissipation? Not at all.

In this book Luccone collected the letters that Fitzgerald wrote during his life to his editor Maxwell Perkins, to his agent Harold Ober and to his friends writers – Hemingway, Wilson – that played a central role in his existence.

These letters and their context, reconstructed in an agile and thrilling story, show the unsuspecting portrait of a sad, fragile and lonely writer, tireless in his mission; an intellectual who intervened in every phase of the editorial work on his books and on the books written by others (as an avid reader of manuscripts, as a scout, as an editor, as a publicist), an immense talent that in the name of art sacrificed himself, until being consumed.
